The Florida State Beekeepers Association was organized at Gainesville on October 6, 1920. A report of the organizational meeting states that a group of 100 enthusiastic beekeepers from all over the state were in attendance. It followed the organization of several strong local associations. The Association has been responsible for several important initiatives over the years, including:

1. An act of the Florida State Legislature, July 1, 1957, which provided to beekeepers compensation for bees and equipment destroyed by the State because of American foulbrood. This has resulted in an extremely low infestation of this important disease.
2. A 1962 program by the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services to certify the specialty honey varieties tupelo and citrus. This provides the possibility of getting a superior price for Florida beekeepers.
3. Hiring extension professionals in apiculture from the 1940s onward by the University of Florida's Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences (IFAS). See the most recent publications dedicated to beekeepers at http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/TOPIC_Beekeeping.
4. Providing over \$20,000 in honey bee research funding for projects at the University of Florida and elsewhere. Responsible for over \$700,000 in honey bee research funding from the Florida Legislature over the last three years.

Florida has approximately 1,500 hobbyists, managing five or fewer honey bee colonies, and 500 full time or side liner beekeepers.

The value of honey bee pollination to Florida growers is estimated to be \$26.4 million annually . Nationwide this is thought to exceed \$14 billion.

All beekeepers in Florida must be registered by law, and no colonies can be sold or purchased without a health certificate issued by the Apiary Bureau, Division of Plant Industry, Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services <http://www.doacs.state.fl.us/pi/plantinsp/apiary/apiary.html>.

Florida beekeepers also participate in two important committees: 1) Honey Bee Technical Council sponsored by the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services (FDACS) advises Florida's Agriculture Commissioner on various honey bee issues.
